NEIGHBOR HIGHLIGHT: SUE BOLLEY

When she retired from teaching, she knew she needed a plan. So College Hill resident Sue Bolley made a list of things to do to keep busy and involved in the Topeka community. At the top of her list was volunteering for Harvesters Food distribution and running for Topeka Public Schools Board of Education. Weeks after retiring, she was distributing food in the Harvesters drive through lines, and in 2020, she was elected the Position 5 School Board member in District 2. Her term expires in 2024.

"I believe educators should serve on the school board. It's even more powerful to have a teacher who worked in the district – in the midst of things," said Bolley. She said she thinks educators have a great understanding of the students' needs, as well as needs of the families, school staff expectations and how to run a school facility.

Bolley's years of teaching experience have helped her immensely as schools have dealt with the global pandemic COVID-19. "This year, I just want everyone to be healthy. And I want kids to progress and learn," Bolley said. "Our Superintendent Tiffany Anderson is dynamic and has led us through this pandemic. She is smart and forward thinking." Bolley said Board members have worked very hard developing plans and keeping families informed. Information is sent through weekly emails and is available on social media. She said the district is working hard to develop a remote learning program that is quality and equitable. But always, in the front of her mind, are the students. "I know kids will adjust to the changes caused by COVID. They can probably handle it better than most adults," Bolley said. "But my heart just breaks for them. I'm sorry they won't have the traditional school experience." As well as enjoying her retirement from teaching, Bolley said serving on the Topeka Public Schools Board is a rewarding job. "I would encourage others in our neighborhood to look at their interests, and get involved," she said. "I love this job, because I felt like I wasn't done giving back to kids – and the school community."


PRESIDENT'S CORNER Dear Friends and Neighbors,

SAFETY IN LIGHTING

Visibility at night is key in maintaining a sense of comfort around your house or block. There are simple ways to improve the safety of our neighborhood but it takes each one of us. Improving street lighting has been shown to correlate positively with decreased crime, an enhanced sense of safety, an increase in outdoor physical exercise, and greater civic pride (Welsh & Farrington 2008; The Conversation 9/28/18). College Hill has many street lights on our numbered streets running East and West, but not as many running North and South. Here's where you come in. Neighbors, turning on porch lights can do wonders! This simple act will light up your block! Some have even found light bulbs with a photocell. You leave the light switch on, it turns on at dusk and turns off at mornings light. Front porch lights help create a better lit space for families, evening dog walkers or pedestrians on their way to one of our delicious neighborhood restaurants. Challenge the neighbors on your block. Block by block, we can improve the safety of College Hill.

IDEA TO CONSIDER An 8W LED from Home Depot costs roughly \$2 and lasts for approximately 5 years when turned on for 12 hours a night. The light bulb uses around 35 kWh over the course of a year, which cost approximately \$4 to light a porch for a year. Yes, home improvements and maintenance isn't cheap but \$4 a year seems reasonable. This small and simple improvement can increase safety and inhibit crime throughout the entire neighborhood.

College Hill Neighborhood Association is working on several grants to enhance lighting throughout the neighborhood. If we all work together, we can make a difference!

TRAFFIC CALMING

College Hill is widely known as an active community. We love to take advantage of our walkable neighborhood for leisure, work, and school. Similarly, it's disheartening when your kids are playing in the front yard and a car flies past going faster than the speed limit. We all want to feel safe and comfortable on our neighborhood roads and sidewalks and on our own property. There are several neighbors interested in looking at ways to make small, incremental changes to some of our intersections to make it safer. These changes would encourage drivers to slow down as they pass through College Hill.
